## Absences

The Hall State School uses Same Day Absence Notification procedures to assist in managing student absences and enforcing parents' obligations to ensure children are enrolled and attend school every school day.

Parents will receive a text message at approximately 10.30am each morning that their child has an unexplained absence from school. There are several ways to communicate with the school concerning your child's absence. Call the Student Absence Line on 49248 266 and leave a message, email [admin@thehalls.eq.edu.au](mailto:admin@thehalls.eq.edu.au) or respond to the absence text message. If your child will be away for more than 10 consecutive school days parents should contact the office to apply for an exemption from compulsory schooling and the student's teacher to obtain work to complete.

## Ambulance

All students are covered by the ambulance. For serious health issues or injuries, parents are contacted and an ambulance is called.

## Arrival at School

Students are not to be at school until 8.30am. If students are unavoidably here before then, they should report to the Library where they will be supervised until 8.40am. Students need to arrive ready to begin learning time at 8.50am. Late arrival disrupts lessons and students can miss important information. **Students who arrive after 9.00am must sign in at the front office before going to class.**

## Assembly

A weekly assembly is held on Tuesday afternoons at 2.20pm under the fig tree, outside our library. Major announcements and presentations, including Student of the Week Certificates are made at this assembly. Parents are very welcome to attend.

## Australian Curriculum

In 2022, The Hall State School will continue to implement the Australian Curriculum for English, Mathematics, Science, Humanities and Social Science (HASS), Global Languages, Design and Technologies, Digital Technology, Music and Health and Physical Education.

The Australian Curriculum gives teachers and students more consistent standards in all schools nationwide and an updated, contemporary 21<sup>st</sup> century curriculum.

The Australian Curriculum sets out the **core knowledge, understanding, skills, cross-curricular priorities and general capabilities that are important for all Australian students**. It identifies what all young people should learn as they progress through schooling, and is the foundation for high quality teaching to meet the needs of all Australian students.

There are three cross-curriculum priorities that have been woven through the Australian Curriculum. These are:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures which allows all young Australians the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding and appreciation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures, their significance for Australia and the impact these have had and continue to have, on our world.
- Asia and Australia's engagement allows all young Australians to develop a better understanding of the countries and cultures of the Asian region. Students will

develop an appreciation of the economic, political and cultural interconnections that Australia has with the region.

- Sustainability which allows all young Australians to develop an appreciation of the need for more sustainable patterns of living and to build the capacities for thinking and acting that are necessary to create a more sustainable future.

Twenty-first century learning does not fit neatly into a curriculum solely organised by learning areas or subjects. That is why the Australian Curriculum has identified seven general capabilities that will assist students in living and working successfully in an increasingly complex, information-rich, globalised world.

These are:

- Literacy
- Numeracy
- Information and Communication Technology Capability
- Critical and Creative Thinking
- Ethical Understanding
- Personal and Social Capability
- Intercultural Understanding

### **Bags**

Students are to keep their school bag in the bag rack nearest their room.

### **Banned Items**

The following items are banned for students at this school; skateboards, chewing gum, spray-on deodorants, white out, iPods/MP3 players, electronic games, toys and other items as the principal may determine.

### **Behaviour Management**

The Hall State School *Student Code of Conduct* clearly sets out the rights and responsibilities of staff, students and parents in the school. We are a Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) School. Our four school expectations of **Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Safe** and **Be a Learner** reflect the high expectations of student behaviour in our school. All students have the right to come to school and feel safe and to be able to engage in learning. No student has the right to interfere with or disrupt the learning of others. Our school is pro-active in establishing excellent behaviour by explicitly teaching our school expectations. We aim to maintain an inclusive, safe and supportive learning environment. Positive student behaviour is strongly encouraged by an established whole-school positive behaviour acknowledgement system.

### **Bicycles and Scooters**

Students who ride a bicycle or scooter to school must wear a helmet. The bicycle/scooter must be kept locked in the school bike racks. Students with bicycles or scooters must enter and leave via the gate closest to the bike racks and the bicycle/scooter needs to be **walked** inside the school grounds. The bike racks are out of bounds during the day.

### **Book List**

These are provided at the end of the year for each year level. Students from Years 1-6 have to buy the basic requirements and the stationery and books for their year level. Prep students have their own list.

## **Breakfast Club**

Our school chaplain runs a breakfast club for all students each Tuesday and Thursday morning from 8.30am. The school supports the alternate days, each Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning from 8:30am. This free service is available to all students and relies on donations of bread and spreads. If you would like to volunteer or make a donation please call the school office.

## **Buses**

At the beginning of each year, and on first enrolment, parents are to notify the school office which days of the week their child/children are catching an afternoon bus. This refers to childcare bus pick-ups and travel on local bus routes. This information is used to create a bus roll.

Students catching a bus must wait at the bus shelter and have their names checked off on the bus roll by the staff member on bus duty. On no account should a student go outside the gate or board a bus without the permission of the staff member on duty. Parents need to notify the School Office if a student is not going to be on a school bus on a particular day. Any misbehaviour on school buses to or from school will not only be dealt with at school but the bus company has the right to put a student off the bus for a period of time.

Bus conveyancing assistance may be available to some students living in the areas to the west of Rockhampton (eg Alton Downs) to travel to and from The Hall State School. Please contact the Transport Department on 4931 1538 for information.

## **Camps**

Year 6 students will have a camp at Brisbane in July/August and Year 5 students will have a camp at North Keppel Island in October. Relevant information is given to these year levels prior to the camps.

## **Cars/Carpark**

Cars/vehicles are not allowed in the school grounds without the permission of the principal. This is for safety reasons. **Parents are not permitted to park in the staff carpark. Students and parents are not permitted to walk through the staff carpark for safety reasons.** Parking for parents is located on the streets surrounding the school.

## **Complaints**

Please contact your child's classroom teacher to discuss your concerns. If you are still concerned please contact Administration and organise an appointment with the principal.

## **Computers and iPads**

Our school has over 100 computers all connected to the school network. These are located in classrooms and the Computer Centre as well as the Library. Each student needs a User Identification and Password to access the school network. This is available from the Library. Students are not permitted to use the User ID and Password of another student.

Some classes also have access to our iPads, as part of our iPad pilot program this year. iPads will continue to be purchased and rolled out across the school over the next few years. Class teachers will undergo specialised training this year in the use of iPads in the classroom. Any inappropriate use of computers or iPads will result in students being banned from using them.

### **Custody orders/parenting agreements**

If your child becomes the subject of either of the above agreements, it is imperative that you provide a copy of these documents to the administration and make an appointment to share the implications for your child. We keep a copy of these documents on file and inform the class teacher of the arrangements. We work with you and relevant authorities including Child Safety and Queensland Police to ensure these orders are followed. However, we can only do this effectively if documents on file are kept current and any changes are shared immediately with us.

### **Dental Clinic**

This service provides free dental treatment to our students. The services are based at Allenstown, Frenchville and Berserker State Schools. Should your child need dental treatment, please contact the Allenstown Dental Clinic on 4922 2673, Frenchville Dental Clinic on 4926 2874, Berserker Dental Clinic on 4926 2319 or Park Avenue Dental Clinic on 4922 2729.

### **Emergency Evacuation**

The school has an emergency evacuation procedure where, on the sounding of the siren, students are evacuated to the oval, rolls are marked and all personnel on the school site accounted for. There are practice emergency evacuations during the year.

### **Enrichment Program**

The Hall State School Enrichment Program supports approximately 12% of the school population in an inclusive classroom setting. We are committed to working in partnership with parents, carers and the wider community to achieve the best possible outcomes for all learners.

Our Co Teachers work collaboratively with all classroom teachers to provide support for Students with Disabilities and those students experiencing difficulties with learning.

### **Enrolment**

The enrolment process at The Hall State School requires an interview with the principal where an "Application for Student Enrolment Form" is completed. Parents and students should bring a recent Report Card and any relevant information from their previous school. If this is the first time a student has enrolled in a state school their birth certificate must be sighted. An alternative to a birth certificate will be considered where it is not possible to obtain a birth certificate. For international students approved for enrolment by Education Queensland International, a passport or visa will be acceptable. Students enrolling in Prep in 2021 must turn 5 years of age by the 30 June 2021. Children who turn 5 by 31 July may be eligible for Early Entry to Prep. An application and interview with the principal is required to determine eligibility. On acceptance of enrolment, various other forms need to be completed including a Media Release Form and an Enrolment Agreement. It is important to maintain accurate "student details" and "emergency contact" information in case of illness of the student. If there are any particular changes to the information on the admission form or specific family concerns (e.g. child custody), the school must be advised in writing, to protect the rights of the parent, child and Principal/Teacher. Medical conditions need to be identified at the enrolment interview so that good care can be taken of the student.

### **Excursions**

Students participate in various excursions as part of their learning. Students going outside the school must be in the correct school uniform to go on an excursion. **The school**



**reserves the right to restrict participation in excursions if a student's behaviour is not acceptable.** The participation of students in an extra-curricular activity is indicated through payment of the fee and provision of a permission form completed by the parent/carer. It is the parent's responsibility to inform the office of their child's medical status.

### **Facilities**

The Hall State School is over 100 years old and has some older buildings, many of which have been refurbished. All rooms in the school are fully air-conditioned. The school grounds, although small, are well kept. This is reflected by the many prizes won in the city gardening competitions.

Our Information Communication Technology facilities are very good with over 100 computers available as well as all classrooms connected to the school network with modern infrastructure. The school has a dedicated computer laboratory. All teaching spaces have interactive television facilities.

Our sporting facilities include two tennis courts, a basketball/netball court, practice cricket wickets and an oval. There are three dedicated infant playgrounds as well as an undercover play area. The school has a number of shaded garden areas and a bus shelter.

The Hall State School also includes Conference on North - a site of historical buildings with modern conference facilities set amongst beautiful tranquil gardens. Open to the public, Conference on North offers a quaint setting, attending to all your meeting and conference requirements.

### **Footwear**

Students must wear closed in **black shoes** at all times. No thongs or sandals are allowed.

### **Environmental Activities**

The Green Team is a lunchtime gardening activity provided for students with a keen interest in gardening and recycling. Activities include planting fruit and vegetable seeds and seedlings and growing plants to harvest stage, and recycling food scraps and containers.

### **Hats**

Students are required to wear a school bucket hat for all outside activities including PE lessons and lunchtimes. If students do not have a hat, they need to be inside or under the buildings. Seated under the shade of our fig tree is also acceptable. Remember:

**No hat - no play!**

### **Homework**

Homework is an important part of school work where students consolidate and practise work they have covered at school. Homework is not meant to be onerous. If a parent finds that a student cannot do the work or is spending too much time on homework, they should stop the child and write a note to their teacher. A guide to the amount of homework would be Years 1-3 up to 1 hour per week, Years 4-5 up to 2-3 hours per week and Year 6 up to 3-4 hours per week. Students need to recognise that there are three types of homework; day to day homework, longer term assignment work and study. A copy of our school homework policy is available on request.

## Houses

The Hall State School has three Houses and every enrolled student is allocated a House. Our Houses are **Archer Eagles (Blue)**, **Jardine Dragons (Yellow)** and **Fitzroy Crocs (Green)**. Our Houses support our Positive Behaviour for Learning 'teams' culture.



## House Team Challenge

The Hall State School *House Team Challenge* has been designed as a two-tier approach to improving positive behavioural outcomes for our learners. Students will be exposed to a 'team culture', which promotes teamwork and working for the greater good of others. The House Team Challenge also provides an opportunity to reinforce our school expectations on a weekly basis. Students earn tokens for displaying a weekly focus, regarding one of the nominated expectations. Each week a winning House is announced at our assembly. At the end of each term, an overall House Team champion is announced.

## Instrumental Music

There is an excellent instrumental music program in the school and students are encouraged to participate. Students may generally join from Year 4 and up for woodwind, brass and percussion or Year 3 and up for strings. The school generally provides an instrument to the student for the first year. After that, the student is expected to purchase their own instrument. The school has a concert band and a strings orchestra as well as a recorder ensemble.

## Internet

Students have access to the internet at school with a User Identification and Password. An Internet Use Agreement form is part of the enrolment process. Education Queensland filters the internet. Any misuse of it will result in a student losing their internet rights. All students have a school e-mail account (webmail) that they may access through the school. It can also be accessed from home. The e-mail is filtered and any inappropriate words that are used are brought to the attention of the Administration. Any inappropriate use of e-mail will result in the student not being allowed to use our computer network.

## Jewellery

Jewellery is strongly discouraged at school. A watch, signet ring, and one earring (plain sleepers or studs) in each ear for pierced ears are the only jewellery items permitted to be worn. No other jewellery is accepted for safety reasons. No other body piercing is acceptable.

## Leaving school

If students have to leave school for some reason during the day, they must be collected by a parent or guardian. Before they are collected from the classroom, the parent/guardian must sign the student out at the Office.

## Library

Students are encouraged to borrow from the school library. A maximum of two books may be borrowed at any time, however, this may be restricted when assignments are given to ensure an equitable distribution of resources. Students need to have a library bag in order to borrow. A waterproof bag is preferable, however a plastic or cloth bag is acceptable. The library is open at lunch times for a range of activities.

## Lockdowns

A lockdown is an emergency procedure where a special song, "Wish you Well" by Bernard Fanning, is sounded and all classes sit on the floor below the window line. Teachers will turn the lights out and lock the doors. We have practice lockdowns throughout the year. If parents arrive at school and hear music through the speaker system – do not enter the school ground.

## Lost Property

All student property should be named. Property which is lost is taken to the stand near the Tuckshop and displayed. Parents are welcome to come into school to check this for lost property. At the end of each term, all clothing still in lost property is donated to a charity.

## Lunch

### First Break – 11:00 a.m.

Morning Tea is eaten as a whole class from 11.00am to 11.10am under staff supervision. If the bell goes for play and students have not finished eating, they must go to the seating area near the Tuckshop.

### Second Break – 1:15 p.m.

Lunch is eaten from 1.15pm to 1.30pm under staff supervision across four designated eating areas – Prep, Year One/Two, Year Three/Four and Year Five/Six. If the bell goes for play and students have not finished eating, they must go to the seating area near the Tuckshop.

As a recycling school, students are educated in correct waste management to reduce landfill. Students are encouraged to bring their lunch in reusable containers or recyclable materials.

## Medication

Student medication is kept at the school office. **Asthma, Anaphylaxis and Diabetes sufferers must have a current Medical Action Plan** in place which can be arranged through the office.

There are **strict departmental guidelines, which must be adhered to when giving out medication.**

Procedures:

- All medication is to be given through the office
- No children are to keep medication in their school bags.
- No child is to dispense their own medication with the exception of asthma reliever puffers which will be dispensed under supervision.
- **No medication will be given unless written parental permission** is given on the required form **AND**
- **No medication will be given unless medication is prescribed by a doctor and is in its original packaging.**
- **NO** non-prescribed un-labelled medication will be given – this includes analgesics such as paracetamol, cough medicines, eye drops etc (ie over the counter medication). This is in accordance with Education Queensland policy.
- All medication given must be registered in the 'Medication Register' – office staff will complete this as each medication is given.

Parents should contact the principal to make arrangements should your child require special health care at school.

### Messages

Only urgent messages will be passed on to students if parents ring the School Office. Messages cannot be guaranteed to be delivered if received after 2.30pm.

### Mobile Phones

Mobile phones are not allowed at school. If you require your child to carry a mobile phone for safety reasons when travelling to or from school, then the phone must be handed into the front office upon arrival at school and collected at 3.00pm.

### Music

The Hall State School is renowned for its award winning choirs. The Senior, Junior and Boys choirs have all performed well at Eisteddfods and other events. They practise during school and lunch times. All students are urged to join one of the School Choirs. The school also has a strong instrumental music program in strings, woodwind, brass and percussion being taught.

### **Outside School Hours Care**

### **Parents' and Citizens' Association**

The Parents' and Citizens' Association (P&C) has a major role supporting the school in many ways. The P&C meets the second Wednesday of each month in the library at 5.30pm. The P&C run the Uniform Shop which is open from 8.30am to 9.30am on Fridays. The P&C also run the School Tuckshop which is open on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. A Family Resource Charge is operated by the P&C to assist with extra resources being provided for student learning at the school. This is set at \$40 per student or \$60 per family per year. Parents are encouraged to support the P&C.

### **Parent /Teacher Interviews**

Parent teacher interviews are held on the last Monday of Term 1 & Term 3 in the library, however, all staff are accessible to parents to discuss a child's education at any time. Parents should seek to obtain an appointment for an interview. Parents may obtain an interview with the principal on any matter affecting their child's education.

### **Pedagogy**

Pedagogy refers to the teaching strategies used by teachers in the classroom to facilitate learning. Each Queensland state school is required to have a pedagogical framework to ensure effective teaching and learning practices are embedded.

This framework promotes consistency of practice, embeds collaborative inquiry processes, alignment of curriculum, pedagogy and assessment and supports critical evaluation of the impact of research-validated pedagogies within the context of the school.

### **Permission for Media**

At the enrolment interview, parents will be asked to complete a State School Consent Form. A completed form allows the school to publish personal information including images when reporting student activities through the school's newsletter, website, social media account or, local media for the purposes of celebrating the student's achievements and promoting the school and state education.

### **Personal Details/Change of Address/Emergency Contact**

If your personal details, address or emergency contacts change, please contact the School Office to update your information.

### **Prep Art & Craft Resource Fee**

Prep activities require a large and varied supply of art and craft materials. The Prep Art & Craft Resource Fee is used to purchase these supplies. This will save parents valuable time in sourcing these materials and also save on storage space as the school will be able to order supplies as needed to suit current activities.

The Prep Art & Craft Resource fee is set at \$35.00. Invoices will be posted at the start of the Prep school year and can be paid at the school office. If you do not wish to participate in this scheme, a consumable list of supplies can be provided for you to purchase.

### **Principal's Medallions**

A Principal's Medallion will be presented to the highest achieving academic student in each class at the end of each year.

### **Privacy Statement**

#### Enrolment Form Details

The Department of Education and the Arts is collecting student and family information on the enrolment form for the purpose of school enrolment and student management. Personal information collected by the Department is protected by the Queensland Government's Information Standard 42 – Information Privacy. However, in accordance with Information Sharing Protocols and Memoranda of Understanding, some of this information may be passed on to government agencies. Some of these State government agencies include Queensland Health, Queensland Transport, Queensland Police Service and Department of Child Safety. The Commonwealth Government, through Centrelink, may require information for matching purposes in relation to the payment of study assistance benefits to some students. Personal information on the enrolment form can be disclosed to other third parties without the individual's consent where authorised or required by law.

#### Attendance/Achievement/Behaviour

While students are enrolled in and attend State schools, school staff will collect personal information about their academic performance, attendance and behaviour for the purpose of monitoring their educational progress and providing educational programs to suit the needs of the student. Year 3 and 5 student names are passed on to the Queensland Studies Authority for the purpose of issuing individual reports in relation to the assessment of numeracy and literacy skills of students. This personal information can be disclosed to other third parties without the individual's consent where authorized or required by law.

#### Wellbeing, Protection and Safety

During a student's attendance, the Department of Education and the Arts may also collect personal information that relates to the wellbeing, protection and safety of the student. This personal information may be passed on to agencies with Education Queensland's Student Protection Policy and other policies relating to student behaviour.

This personal information can be disclosed to other third parties without the individual's consent where authorized or required by law.

#### Children and Young People in the Care of the State – Data-Matching

The Department of Education and Department of Families conduct a data-matching program to improve school achievement outcomes for children and young people in care. The data-matching program involves a comparison, through a unique identifier, of certain personal information of children and young people in care and those children of similar age in the general school population, including those who have specific needs. This personal information may include:

- Achievement levels
- School year levels
- Retention rates

- School disciplinary absences
- Age
- Student movement between schools

### Refund Policy

School excursions and camps enhance a student's learning by providing opportunities for the student to participate in activities, both curriculum-related and recreational, outside the normal school routine. School fees for extra-curricular activities, are calculated on a cost recovery only basis, according to the number of students who have indicated their attendance. Participation of students in an extra-curricular activity is indicated through payment of the fee and provision of a permission form completed by the parent/carer. As the school budget cannot meet any shortfalls in funding for an extra-curricular activity, due to the subsequent non-participation of a student who had previously indicated attendance of the activity, fees already paid for an extra-curricular activity may be refunded in full or part or not at all, having regard to the associated expenses incurred and the circumstances of the non-participation.

Refunds are not granted automatically if students do not attend an activity. Written requests must be submitted on the Request for Refund form. All requests for refunds must be made within 30 days of the activity using this form. Refunds won't be paid immediately but will be paid after reconciliation of the activity. Refunds under \$25 will be processed as credits against the student's account and used to offset any future charges.

### Religious Instruction

Religious instruction (RI) is offered at our school and is conducted on Thursday's in the Middle Session of the day.

The faith groups that provide religious instructors to deliver an authorised program are listed below:

Parents of children participating in these programs will be advised if a faith group requires funds to cover the expense of materials used in RI.

Students are allocated to RI based on information provided by parents on the completed [Application for Student Enrolment](#) unless other written instructions have been provided to the school.

**Note:** This information remains operational unless the parent informs the school otherwise in writing.

Students who are not participating in RI will be provided with other instruction in a separate supervised location. Other instruction must relate to part of a subject area already covered in class and may include, but is not restricted to:

- revision of class work such as creative writing or literacy and/or numeracy activities which could include online programs currently accessed by the students of that school (i.e. Study Ladder, Mathletics, Reading Eggs)
- wider reading such as independent reading appropriate to the student

Parents will be advised of any changes to the RI and other instruction programs to ensure they are able to make an informed decision on their child's participation.

### **Reporting on Student Progress**

Formal written reports are produced at the end of Semester 1 and 2. As mentioned, Parent Teacher interviews will be held on the last Monday of Term 1 & Term 3 in the library.

### **Safety**

Safety of students is a major priority for our school. If parents or students see any unsafe situation or procedure, the school should be notified.

### **Student Council**

The Student Council is made up of all the Student Leaders from Years 5-6. The Student Council meets on a regular basis to organise events and create opportunities for students, to better our school, to participate in community service and to provide an official avenue through which student concerns are taken to the Teachers and the Principal.

### **Student Leaders**

The following school leadership positions will be selected from the Year six cohort; Two School Captains, Two Music Captains, Six House Captains, Two Environment Captains. In addition, Year 5 - 6 students may become Student Leaders subject to certain conditions being met.

## School Watch

This is a community program where people are asked to contact the Police if they notice any suspicious activity out of hours at the school. Contact 131 788 if this is the case.

### **Sick Bay**

If a student feels ill at school, they notify their teacher who will send them to the First Aid Room (Sick Bay) presently in the school office. Parents will normally be contacted and asked to collect their student if they are ill for more than a half hour. If a student is injured at school, they are also to go to the First Aid Room and parents will be contacted. If the injury is serious, the Ambulance will be called.

### **Sport**

The Hall State School participates in the Rockhampton Primary School Sports Association competitions on a Friday afternoon for Senior students. The major sports played include AFL, basketball, cricket, netball, Oztag, rugby league, soccer, softball and tennis. The school also has swimming, cross country and athletics carnivals as well as providing avenues for students in all other representative sports.

### **Sports Equipment**

Sports equipment may be borrowed by students from the sports shed at lunch breaks.

### **Student Free Days**

In 2022, the only Student Free Day held during the school term is on Friday 2 September. This date aligns with all public and private schools across Queensland. Student Free Days occur during the year for Staff to undertake Professional Development. All other Student Free Days for The Hall State School are held during the students' school holidays.

### **Student of the Week**

Each week, the class teacher selects a 'Student of the Week'. These are published in the newsletter and newflashes and the certificate is presented at the next assembly.

### **Student Support**

#### Positive Learning Centre

We have two Positive Learning support teachers based at The Hall State School. They work with students from our school as well as other local schools.

#### Chaplain

We have a School Chaplain for two days per week (Tuesdays and Thursdays). The Chaplaincy Service forms one part of the school's Social and Emotional Learning Program, providing pastoral care and general spiritual, social and emotional comfort to all students, staff and parents who wish to access this service. The Chaplaincy Service supports students, their families and staff of all beliefs and does not seek to impose any beliefs or persuade an individual toward a particular set of beliefs.

The Chaplaincy Service is funded by the National School Chaplaincy and Student Welfare Program (Department of Education, Employment and Workforce Relations) and the Rockhampton Local Chaplaincy Committee through the funding recipient Scripture Union.

#### Guidance Officer

Our school has access to a School Guidance Officer two days per week (Wednesdays and Thursdays). Appointments may be made at the School Office.

#### Positive Behaviour for Learning Team

This team consists of teachers, teacher aides and administration representatives who work with the whole school community to ensure the PBL process meets our school needs.

### Tuckshop

The Tuckshop operates on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. The preferred method of ordering is through the online *Flexischools* system. You can register by visiting [www.flexischools.com.au](http://www.flexischools.com.au). Alternatively students may order their tuckshop before school or place it in the basket in their classroom. Our tuckshop meets the requirements of the 'Healthy Choices' policy determined by Education Queensland. Occasionally, the school will have a "Red Day" where other foods may be sold.

### Uniform

The Hall State School has a school dress code which has been endorsed by the school P & C. All students are expected to wear the full school uniform. Uniform includes:

School shirt.

Navy shorts, skorts or skirt.

House shirts and bucket hat

Navy blue socks and black shoes.

Navy broad brimmed hat with emblem.

Uniforms must be in good condition. Children must wear a school hat for all outdoor activities. The Hall State School is a "Sun Smart" school where there is a strict policy of **'No hat – No play'**. Students are not permitted to represent the school or go on excursions outside the school unless they are in the correct school uniform. Some special uniforms for the choirs and sporting teams are provided by the school. Any student who does not wear the correct school uniform, needs to bring a note from their parents to the Principal. The school may ask a student out of uniform to change into one provided by the school.

A watch, signet ring, and one earring (plain sleepers or studs) in each ear for pierced ears are the only jewellery items permitted to be worn. Jewellery may need to be removed for sport in accordance with the school Safety Policy. Medical bracelets/necklaces are permitted. Nail polish, make-up and perfume is not to be worn to school. Students are encouraged to wear sunscreen. Hairstyles must be neat, clean, tidy and of natural toning. Long hair must be tied back with white or blue ties only. Student will be asked to remove items that are not part of the uniform. Repeated offences will mean the item may be held in safe keeping until 3pm in the school office.

The Parents' and Citizens' Association run a Uniform Shop which is opened on Friday mornings from 8.30am to 9.30am. The preferred method of ordering is through the online *Flexischools* system. You can register by visiting [www.flexischools.com.au](http://www.flexischools.com.au). Orders can also be placed at the office anytime during the week but must be accompanied with cash payment. The Uniform Shop does not have EFTPOS facilities. Any price changes will be communicated to the school community.
